



Global Infant and Young Child Feeding Practices (%)









Negligible progress

Breastfeeding Saves Lives!





NCDs Development




- Protective effect on non-communicable diseases

The economic argument




- US insurers pay US\$ 3.6 billion to treat diseases preventable by breastfeeding (Montgomery DL,1997)
- US would save \$13 billion per year and prevent an excess 911 infant deaths if exclusively breastfeeding for 6 months is practiced (Bartick MC et al, 2013)



How much to invest?

The WB Estimate 2010





US\$2.9 billion
15 USD/Per household in 36 high burden countries

Reflects only "Behaviour change interventions to promote breastfeeding."

Behavior change interventions

- Breastfeeding promotion and support
- CF promotion
- Hand washing with soap and promotion of hygiene behaviors



Breastfeeding Gear Model








Way forward

Governments



Plan and budget for the comprehensive implementation of the GSIYCF

Conduct policy and programme assessments on IYCF to find gaps

Develop national and sub-national action plans with budgets to achieve results

Develop monitoring and reporting systems

Institutionalise research

Report annually on the expenditure incurred on interventions for optimal breastfeeding

Take urgent action on policy matters such as maternity leave

Global community



Allocate specific budgets for increasing optimal breastfeeding

Revisit estimates on scaling up nutrition intervention

Make a priority commitment of their staff time

Report annually the money spent on programmes on improving policy and programmes for optimal breastfeeding

Setup a special maternity benefit fund for cash assistance to women below the poverty line
