REPORT

The Second International T-O-T in Infant and Young Child Feeding Counseling was successfully organized from 15th January 2007 to 28th January 2007 at UCMS & GTB Hospital Delhi by Dr MMA Faridi. Dr MMA Faridi was Course Director. Dr Anita Gupta, Dr Dheeraj Shah and Dr Kiran Guleria complemented Dr MMA Faridi in the clinical practices sessions. Eight master trainees and 43 Infant and Young Child Feeding Counseling Specialist trainees participated in the T-O-T (annex-1).

The master trainees were from Indonesia, Nepal and Indian states of Delhi, Uttranchal, Punjab & Haryana. Seven of them were medical doctors in Pediatrics, Obst. & Gynecology and Community Medicine. A lone master trainee was a nurse. The infant and young child feeding counseling specialists were from Indonesia, Nepal, and Indian States of Delhi, UP, Haryana, Karnataka, and Madhya Pradesh. The infant and young child feeding counseling trainees comprised of medical officer, nurses, medical post graduate students, PhD scholars in nutrition, NGO's working in the field of child nutrition (World Vision), faculty of medical colleges and PPTCT counselor.

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The T-O-T was organized in two phases. First phase of T-O-T lasted from January 15th to 20th 2007. The first phase was inaugurated by officiating Principal Dr S.K.Bhargav and Additional Medical Superintendent Dr N.K.Sinha with the lightening of lamp on 15th January 2007. On this occasion Dr Tarsem Jindal, Chief Coordinator, BPNI and Dr Arun Gupta National Coordinator, IBFAN Asia-Pacific were also present.

The master trainees were prepared to become master trainers of infant and young child feeding counseling during the first phase according to a very exhaustic schedule (annex-2). On 21st January 2007 the Course Director along with eight master trainees discussed training schedule of infant and young child feeding counseling for specialist trainees in the second phase.

The second phase (Jan22-28, 2007) was started with the inauguration on 22nd January 2007 by the Dr Arvind Saili, President of National Neonatology Forum of India by lightening of the lamp. The Principal UCMS, Dr K.K.Sharma welcomed the participants and other guests on this occasion. Dr Arun Gupta emphasised that infant and young child feeding counseling should be an integral part of all maternal and child health care programmes. Dr MMA Faridi described the process of T-O-T in infant and young child feeding counseling. The second phase of the training was conducted according to a very exhaustic timetable from 9 am to 6:30 pm. The training continued on Republic Day, 26th January, and on Sunday, 28th January 2007 (annex-3).

The entire training was conducted through training tools, developed by BPNI, IBFAN, WABA and UNICEF which included Trainers guide, Participants manual, counseling flip chart, power point presentation, peer counseling session, demonstration role play, written exercises, video clips and practical side clinical practices.

The program started every day at 9 o'clock sharp by a prayer, which was conduct by one of the trainees. It was followed by a quick recap by any one participant. All sessions and lunch and teas breaks were dot on time. This was the high light of this training. At the end of the day from 6:30pm to 7:30 pm the trainers meeting was held every day except on 28th January 2007. In the trainers meeting appraisal of the days training and skill augmentation was done and plan for the next day was prepared.

It was very satisfying that all the master trainees as well as infant and young child feeding counseling specialists were punctual, tried to learn skills and exhibited a desire to practice these skills in their day to day patient care management. On the last day, on 28th January 2007, one and a half hour was spent with the master trainees and infant and young child feeding counseling specialist trainees to discuss how to establish infant and young child feeding counseling center. They were taken around the infant and young child feeding counseling center of the GTB Hospital and were given hand out on the subject.

The training ended with a valedictory function in the afternoon of 28th January 2007. Dr Tarsem Jindal distributed the certificate to all participants and master trainers of infant and young child feeding counseling specialists trainees. The participants and infant and young child feeding counseling specialist were also given postal and E-mail addresses of all master trainers as well as a group photo of all participants.
